We know that you are familiaf with the case of **Sergei Magnitsky** and that you have expressed, in public and in private (with the Russian authorities), concern at the absence of any meaningful progress towards securing justice for Mr Magnitsky and his family, more than three years after his death in pre-trial detention. His posthumous trial, albeit recently postponed, is an unacceptable attempt to damage the reputation of a man who is not able to defend himself, and to cause harm to his family.

We continue to raise our concerns about this case with the Russian authorities on a bilateral basis and through other opportunities such as the EU/Russia dialogue. Many other Council of Europe Member States are doing the same.

We have been considering what more the Council of Europe can do to press the Russian authorities to bring this case to a thorough conclusion and, separately, support the development of Russia's judicial systems – the failure to secure justice for Mr Magnitsky (Russian authorities announced yesterday that the investigation into his death would be dropped) is being interpreted as symbolic of the failings of Russia's judicial systems. Both actions would be consistent with the Council of Europe's important role in reminding the Russian Federation of its relevant obligations and ensuring that all member states are effectively held to account, as part of a strengthened rules-based international system. This would also be consistent with the emphasis you are placing on strong and independent judicial systems as bulwarks against corruption, and as pillars of a mature democracy.

We would be grateful therefore if you could continue to raise the case, using your contacts with Russian authorities to express the importance of bringing this case to a thorough conclusion, explaining that doing so would demonstrate a positive signal for the future of human rights and democracy in Russia.
