PANEL III: Tracking digital footsteps. The internet as a tool for investigation.

The targeting and recruitment of victims and their exploitation via online channels requires a comprehensive strategy for law enforcement and *prosecution* to track and investigate such online activities. The prosecution of the perpetrators of human trafficking is, by nature, a responsive rather than proactive approach. How to ensure that investigation and prosecution strategies keep in pace with technological developments and changing modi operandi? For sure, governments will need the support of other actors and institutions in their efforts, which makes creating effective partnerships essential. In this panel session, participants will address a range of issues relating to the prosecution of human trafficking activities including online investigations, digital forensics, digital footsteps, as well as the investigation of online money flows. Which innovative methods are currently being used and developed? And what legal, ethical, and practical dilemmas do law enforcement agencies and prosecution services encounter when

using such methods?
